Bug Club

- 4) You will be presented with a picture of a Bug (don't click on it) scroll down and it says 'International users please click the following link'.
- 5) You will now be on the usual Pearson Bug Club screen enter logon details as usual.

There's a school expectation that in Year 5 & 6 children should read for at least 20 minutes every evening; either on Bug Club, their school reading book, Library book or a book of their choice.


Arabic

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Homework Guidelines

As a general rule, children should be reading for between 20 and 30 minutes every night (where possible). It is also expected that children spend another 20 to 30 minutes doing their homework. If a child has finished their homework then the children should be working on an educational website/revision work/projects or something independent that will promote their learning. The amount of homework/type of homework/time needed for homework can vary from week to week.

Importantly, if a child has spent the allotted time on homework and still has not completed it, then the child should be allowed to stop. Parents should provide a note on the work to inform the teacher that time has been spent on the work but you have not been able to complete it. Responding to parent emails

When contacting your child's class teacher please expect a response within 24 working hours. If your child has an emergency appointment during the school day or a change of pick up arrangements please inform **info_jps** rather than the class teacher. The admin staff will then inform the class teacher as to the relevant changes.

As you will appreciate a teachers day is a very busy one, teaching, marking and preparing for lessons, so any contact with parents is likely to be either before or after the school day. The children are our priority!

If you wish to contact your class teacher for a particular reason please ensure this is done so within the working week. Any emails received after 2:30pm on a Thursday afternoon or over the weekend will be responded to by the close of day on Sunday.

IMPORTANT INFORMATION ABOUT COMMUNICATING WITH SCHOOL AND TEACHERS

For your child's safety, it is of the utmost importance that the right people get messages concerning students during the day. Teachers can be away from the classroom/ school for a variety of reasons and cannot always pick up your messages. To ensure this happens please read below for details of when, how and who to communicate with during the school day:

- Any messages need to be sent to the class teacher AND Info_jps@gemsedu.com
- If the child is to ride/not ride the bus (email to be received by 1:00pm), kindly send an email to Info jps@gemsedu.com and communicate with the bus conductors.
- Please email class teachers and Info jps@gemsedu.com if you need to take your child out of school for an EMERGENCY medical appointment. Please give as much notice as possible. (Ideally 24/48 hours)
- All emails received before 3:00 pm on Info_jps@gemsedu.com, will be answered on the same day.

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SCHOOL UNIFORM POLICY

Foundation Stage:

Uniform listed below except boys and girls wear JPS polo shirts and no ties.

Boys: Years 1 to 6

JPS shorts

White short sleeve shirt (JPS logo on pocket)

Short blue socks

Black shoes (trainers not acceptable) **Navy blue** pullover + JPS logo
JPS blue tie

Girls: Years 1 to 6

White JPS blouse
JPS pinafore dress
Short white socks – these should be plain white
Navy blue tights
Black shoes (no heels. Trainers are not acceptable)
Navy blue cardigan + JPS logo
No nail varnish
No make-up
No jewellery, except for a small pair of stud earrings.

EARLY PICK OF CHILDREN

I wanted to pass this information on to you regarding a new policy in JPS for 'Early Pick Up'. Due to an increase to the number of children leaving school before the end of the school day, our Senior Leadership Team are will now be the only members of staff within JPS who can authorise permission to leave school early. This policy took effect on 25th September 2014 as highlighted in the school newsletter. Therefore, I or any teacher in Year 5, is unable to grant permission for your request. The procedure at JPS requires parents/careers to complete a 'Leave within the school day' requests form (attached). This is also found on the home page of www.jumeirahprimary.weebly.com.

This form needs to be completed and signed by a member of the Senior Leadership Team at least **24 hours ahead** of the early collection. The form must be accompanied by the appointment notification with the specialist. Doctors and Dentists who operate outside of school hours do not qualify as a reason to leave school. An emergency by its very nature will be the only exception to this rule.

Please note that children will not be sent down to reception until parents have arrived; this is in order to avoid situations which have recently occurred in which children have become upset whilst waiting for a parent at reception. This might mean you will need to plan an extra few minutes into your schedule on these occasions.

ENGLISH OBJECTIVES: Term 3.1 (WEEK 1-2)

Non-chronological Report (assessment)

FOCUS: write a newspaper article related to the Topic (a person who has migrated to another country)

GVP FOCUS:



Expanded '-ed' clauses, e.g. Encouraged by the bright weather, Jane set out for a long walk. Terrified by the dragon, George fell to his knees.

(WEEK 3-4)

Poetry

FOCUS: Write a Nonsense and Cinquain poem. This can be related to our Topic or Science if the children wish.

GVP FOCUS:

Punctuation – chn to be given a variety of texts minus punctuation which they have to imbed. Teach areas of weakness.

(WEEK 5-7)

Discussion (assessment)

FOCUS: Write an essay based around our topic of Migration. This could be in the form of story written about migration from the perspective of a biography or just a story.

GVP FOCUS:

Elaborated adverbial phrases, e.g. Beyond the dark gloom of the cave, Zach saw the wizard move.

Throughout the restless, disturbed night, the wind howled like an injured creature.

(WEEK 8-9)

Narrative:

FOCUS: Children will learn to describe settings. They will then choose a setting of their own and create one.

GVP FOCUS:

Consolidate:

Punctuation, letter, word, sentence, capital letter, full stop, question mark, exclamation mark, 'speech marks', direct speech, inverted commas, bullet point, apostrophe (contraction & possession), commas

MATHS OBJECTIVES: TERM 3.1

(WEEK 1-3)

ROMAN NUMERALS/MEASUREMENT

- read Roman numerals to 1000 (M) and recognise years written in Roman numerals.
- estimate volume [for example, using 1 cm3 blocks to build cuboids (including cubes)] and capacity [for example, using water]
- solve problems involving converting between units of time
- use all four operations to solve problems involving measure [for example, length, mass, volume, money] using decimal notation, including scaling.

(WEEK 4-6)

PROPERTIES OF SHAPE/TIME



- know angles are measured in degrees: estimate and compare acute, obtuse and reflex angles
- draw given angles, and measure them in degrees (o)

Identify:

- angles at a point and one whole turn (total 360o)
- angles at a point on a straight line and ½ a turn (total 180o)
- other multiples of 90o
- use the properties of rectangles to deduce related facts and find missing lengths and angles
- Time analogue and digital time (telling the time to nearest minute)
- Solving time problems including use of schedules

(WEEK 7-9)

STATISTICS (2 weeks)

- solve comparison, sum and difference problems using information presented in a line graph
- complete, read and interpret information in tables, including timetables.
